REMEMBERING CHARLES FOSKETT

1920 - 2009

Long time St. Joseph Council Brother Charlie Foskett passed away April 9th. Charlie was a member of the Knights of Columbus for more than 60 years having transferred to St. Joseph Council in the early 1960's.

He immediately became involved in Council activities during those early formative years as Council Activities Chairman in 1961, then Six Point Chairman in 1963 and in 1985-86 he served our Council as Grand Knight. It is sad to note that his passing comes less than a year after his Knights of Columbus brother, Bill Comiskey, who were boyhood friends from mid-manhattan when they joined the service during world war II.

Speaking of which, some of our brothers are aware of Charlies exploits during WW2 but they bear repeating. As a member of the Army Air Corps he was stationed in Italy. As a crew member on the B24 Liberator bomber he flew on missions over Germany. On what was to be his last mission his bomber was hit and, after finally freeing his chute, he was able to parachute from the plane and became a POW in a German prison camp. As Sarah, his wife, relates, as the Russians were approaching, on their drive to Berlin, the guards abandoned the camp and the British and Americans found their way towards Allied lines.

Not quite 20 years ago, He and Sarah relocated to Rhode Island to be closer to their children, but have always kept in touch. Charlie leaves many friends in the Council and Sarah wishes to thank everyone for their cards and thoughts.

ST. JOSEPH COUNCIL—A 50 YEAR RETROSPECTIVE

In keeping with our fiftieth anniversary as a council, it is fitting to look back and take satisfaction and a measure of pride in how St. Joseph Council has fulfilled the stated purposes of the Knights of Columbus.

Section 2 of the CHARTER OF THE KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS states that “The Purposes for which said corporation is formed are as follows:”

“(a) of the rendering pecuniary aid to its members, their families and beneficiaries of members and their families.”

Time and again the brothers of St. Joseph Council through the fraternal assistance fund and by spontaneous and spur of the moment action have gone to the rescue of members and their families in need, with timely financial aid. Such aid has also taken the form of deferral of annual dues for those brothers who find themselves in dire circumstances.

“(b) of rendering mutual aid and assistance to its sick, disabled and needy members and their families.”

Get well cards; personal phone calls and visits to sick beds, hospitals, and nursing homes; delivering food and medicines to brothers and their family members suffering from illness or injury; the constant providing of transportation to pharmacies, doctors' offices, labs and hospitals; providing financial assistance where necessary; bringing hot meals to shut-ins – all these things and more have been part of the rich tradition of the council since day one. It has been hands-on, personal and with tender, loving care – like Jesus would have done.

“(c) of promoting social and intellectual intercourse among its members and their families.”

St. Joseph Council's program of timely and diversified lectures in areas such as charity, education, law enforcement, government, medicine, social issues, law, and most importantly, spiritual enrichment, have informed and enriched the lives of many over the past fifty years. The council's social program is second to none. Many social events held at the Council Hall and elsewhere each year have built a strong comradeship among the brothers and extended a sense of family to their wives, children, siblings, and significant others as well. The delicious repast served after each council meeting has given the members the opportunity to continue the fellowship engendered at each meeting in the more informal cozy nook downstairs after the close of each business meeting.

“(d) of promoting and conducting educational, charitable, religious, social welfare, war relief and welfare, and public relief work.”

The anthology of St. Joseph Council's programs of good works speaks for itself: Speaker's Program; Charitable and Benevolent Program; Pro-Life Activities, including Birthright Baby Shower; Northport Veterans Hospital Volunteer Program; Annual barbecue at Camp Alvernia for developmentally challenged children; Christmas parties for orphans; significant aid to facilities such as the Cleary Home for the Hearing Impaired and the Little Flower Home for children without families; the needy families Christmas basket collection and distribution program; sponsoring kids' free-throw contests; sponsoring a Little League team; funding and administering a Council Scholarship Fund for worthy candidates in need; annual men's retreat; Communion Breakfast; Nocturnal adoration; Widows and widowers social and support group; Mass for deceased brothers; Thanksgiving Day Mass; Annual adults' and children's Christmas parties; Annual Memorial Day dedication and wreath-laying for the men of Greenlawn who gave their lives serving in the military of the United States; Prison Ministry; Eyeglasses and food for the underprivileged; Cash contributions to countless charities on Long Island and elsewhere; Letters of appreciation and encouragement to soldiers serving in Iraq and Afghanistan. It goes on and on.

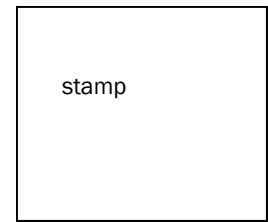

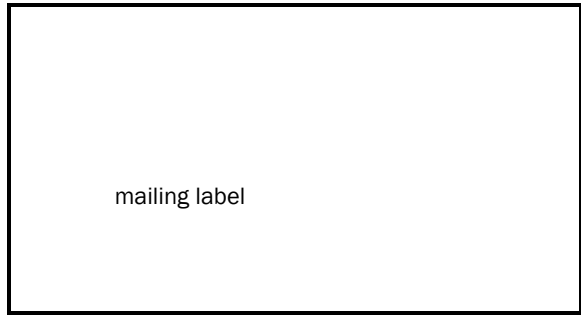
